PIONEER DAY CELEBRATION HELD AT MUSEUM

CRESCENT 3RD GRADERS STAKE THEIR CLAIMS

Around 8:30 a.m. on April 25, school buses filled with Crescent Elementary third grade students rolled onto the museum grounds for the annual Pioneer Days Celebration. The celebration had been held on the school grounds in years past, but this year the museum was asked to participate in the event.

The students spent the morning rotating through lessons at the Alpha School (a completely restored one-room school-



house on the museum grounds), museum tours, lessons on food preparation and preservation (as it was in the days of the land run), and a lesson (complete with hands on

demonstrations) with the quilting club in the Fellowship Hall of the church on museum grounds. The students enjoyed a full morning learning about everyday life and living conditions from 1889

and through the early part of the 1900s.

Just before noon, the students, teachers, parents and museum staff gathered on the north side of the museum to watch a staged reenactment by the Guthrie Gun Fighters.



The gun fighters set the scene of a couple making a claim for their land. Soon, a claim jumper tried to steal the claim and a law man stepped in and 'took care of the

claim jumper'. The students learned how confusing it must have been at the Land Office when claims were disputed and how difficult it must have been to determine who laid the proper claim.


The 'pioneers' who were organized into family groups, lined up to make the run. When the shot was fired, these 'families' ran to stake their claims and set up their 'homesteads'. Once their plot of ground was chosen, the head of the family headed to the Land Office to file their claim. With the claims





properly filed, the families settled down on their claim for lunch. The Horn family brought their instruments and played for the 'settlers' and museum guests.

The students were pretty excited when the Territorial Wagon Club circled their wagons on the museum's north lawn. Several of the wagon club members invited the children to look inside the wagons and they were allowed to pet some of the mules.

Members of the FFA brought a cow to milk.




Square dancing was a fun favorite.

We are looking forward to working with school personnel to make this an annual event on the museum grounds. The staff definitely enjoyed this interaction with the children and look forward to next year's Pioneer Days Celebration.

The success of this event was largely due to the dedicated involvement and superior organization by the school personnel in planning and carrying out all phases



of this educational experience and the large number of volunteers that came together to make it such a fun and memorable day.
